Research Interests

I have a broad interest in clinical psychology, particularly relating to interpersonal theory and associated circumplex models. I am interested in how circumplex data can contribute to a better understanding of personality traits and Axis II personality disorders. Also of interest are interpersonal rigidity, intrapsychic influences on perception of interpersonal transactions (e.g. parataxic distortions), individual variability in personal expression of psychopathology (e.g. pathoplasticity), and complementarity.

Current Independent Research Project:

My current research project focuses on the effects of dispositional variables on the acceptance of neutralization techniques. Neutralizations techniques are a priori justifications used by an individual to mitigate dissonance over an anticipated action that is inconsistent with one's usual values. The majority of research on neutralization emphasizes the situational and/or demographic factors that predict increased acceptance of neutralization techniques. Surprisingly, few studies have addressed how dispositional variables relate to neutralization acceptance. The present study related a variety of dispositions (achievement motives, personality traits, interpersonal style, and narcissism) to the acceptance of neutralization techniques. Hierarchical regression analysis suggested that dispositional variables significantly contributed to explaining neutralization acceptance above and beyond demographic variables. Future research and real world applications of neutralization acceptance are discussed.
